Felling pretty despondant because every single one of my western shows clashes with an event that he will be riding at (and that I will have to groom at). In addition I now have a WB gelding along with my appies so there is a chance for me to compete at Intro level too, or watch boyf competing him on my behalf.

I'm basically facing up to the fact that if I want to carry on with western (which I love);) I have to carry on paying out for my Appies, lorry, equipment, entry fees, diesel- now really expensive as I have to travel from Scotland for each event down south and we only have 2 shows to go to in Scotland this year),stabling costs and my accommodation. This averages out to at least £300 per show.:pinch:

In contrast I can compete locally in "English" riding on a weekly basis up here for far less money and less hassle.

I'm so torn. I had the most fantastic first season in Western riding, met such friendly people and enjoyed myself immensely- but can I really justify spending hundreds of pounds on only a few competitions each season?:(

Hi, How are you? (Laura with Nico/Exbury Ghost here!) Well my answer may be unfair as obviously I know a little background to your situation. The questions that immediately springs to mind are -

Do you enjoy "english" or eventing?
Would you event your WB yourself?
How competitive would you be? Does that matter to you?

For my money it is quite possible to event at Novice level without a groom, the question is do you think you "should" be there, I don't believe you "need" to be there.

With a seperate lorry, you should follow what YOUR dreams are - you are not reliant on D and I don't think he would expect you to give up what you want in order to groom for him. Put simply would you get more enjoyment out of grooming than you would out of competing?

I groom for Mark at the polo, but equally if I wanted to do something with muley, Mark would have to pay a groom for the day or play alternate chukkas - this wouldn't cause a domestic, the fact is I rarely do it as I enjoy the polo and muley is not that competitive!!!
